DCC Ready, DCC On Board, DCC Compatible?

Over the last year I have had several club members ask me about what these terms mean. If you are considering purchasing an engine it is important that you know what you are purchasing. The first thing you should know is that most engines sold today are “dual-mode” and no matter what terms they use concerning DCC, it will run on a DC layout.

An engine that has “DCC On Board” means just that; it contains a DCC decoder and will operate in DCC mode. It does not however, mean that it has sound. In fact, unless it specifically states it has sound, it probably does not. If you want sound, you will need to replace the engine’s existing decoder with a sound decoder. Please note that in addition to the sound decoder you will also need to fit a capacitor and speaker into the engine. So, if the engine was not designed to accommodate a sound decoder you may find it a challenge to fit these extra items into the engine.

An engine that is “DCC ready” does not have a DCC decoder, however it is been wired to accept a DCC decoder. To operate this engine in DCC mode you will need to purchase and install a compatible DCC decoder. The key is to purchase a compatible decoder. If your decoder is compatible with your engine all you need to do is to remove the engine shell and plug the decoder into the socket on the engine.

Some companies (like MTH) sell engines that are advertised as “DCC Compatible”. These engines are not true DCC engines. You may be able to change their DCC address and operate them on a DCC layout. However, you will not be able to use a standard DCC decoder programmer to change many of their CV addresses. If you wish to modify a DCC compatible engine you will need to purchase the company specific programming system.

Finally, old DC engines that were built before the DCC standard became popular will not have any DCC wiring. Assuming they run well, most of them can be modified to accept a DCC decoder (including sound decoders). The modification will involve some wire cutting and soldering. Depending upon the engine manufacturer and decoder the modification can range from simple to very challenging. There are many “how-to” videos on YouTube on this subject so you should be able to find one that fits your situation.

I hope this information has been useful. If you have any questions please let me know and I will try to answer them.
