FSMRRC HORSESHOE CURVE TRIP:

On Thursday, June 2, 2016, Paul Roy, Richard Stockslager, Les Souder and Jim Thompson left Les' house at 1:30 P.M. for Enola, PA., arriving at 4:00 P.M. at the Norfolk Southern Enola Yard. We took photos and watched trains for layout ideas. We departed there for Juniata Creek to follow the tracks for track plans until we arrived at Altoona. We stayed at the new Microtel Inn and Suites. The hotel suggested Hoss' Buffet for dinner, which was fantastic.

Friday, we ate breakfast at the hotel and departed to Gallitzin on a slick, rainy path downhill only to come upon a work train on a balloon track. (See photos at meeting). On to Gallitzin West Bound Tunnel, west side of town, noting numerous trains. The first train was two new SD80's N & S Engines with 120 gondolas and 2 SD40's on the rear. Then a three-mile drive through the "jungle" thanks to the directions from the east side town cop. Upon arrival we met a number of other rail fans. We took tons of photos of the east side of tunnel with 2 rails through and the old abandoned tunnel. (See photos at meeting). We had ordered subs at a Subway in Gallitzin, downtown at the tunnel entrance. Then we went to the Curve to eat lunch and take another ton of photos. The first unit was a U.P. with 2 N.S. units pulling about 100 coal cars. We spent the whole day watching trains. About every 15 minutes the trains would go by. A train with two engines pulling about 120 coal cars (empty I think), as there were no helpers on the end, went by. It was quite impressive to see trains passing each other and on numerous occasions engine trains side by side going up the mountain. It was all possible due to the fact Charlie's Tree Service had just spent 10 weeks removing trees that had been blocking the view. There is also a lift to take you to the top of the curve or you can still use the steps.

Then we went to Shaffer's Full Steam Ahead Hobby Shop and met some nice folks and made a few purchases. Then we went to the Prime Buffet. This is the same place we went

for dinner the last time we visited Horseshoe Curve and Kevin Herrmann had 5 plates full. They asked us if he was with us and we said "no". They said "Thank God". Then we went to the Altoona Association of Model Railroads, a Club we had visited before. They were just installing an N Scale layout someone had given them that was downstairs. Upstairs was their HO Scale layout with O Scale running around outside. All of the locomotive memorabilia, (and I mean tons) the number board and placards, were real. We got back to the hotel about 9:00 P.M. We had been training for about 9 hours or more and it was a long and tiring day. Everyone had a good night's sleep.

The next morning we had a great breakfast and then off to the Altoona Shops in downtown Altoona. We watched them change engines on a working turntable. What a sight to see!! We saw the rebuilding site where engines were stripped and rebuilt. We passed the tank car repair facility. We also passed Alto Tower and took a few photos. Alto Tower is where we were about 14 years ago, when a female switch operator came down and invited us up to the tower to watch the operation. A memory never lost!!

Then we went to Cresson. It was extremely interesting this time because there is a locomotive graveyard with numerous engines cut up. They wouldn't let us bring one home. We took some photos of the town as it shows the old historic time frame. It also has a second N5C caboose 477869.

From there we went to South Fork and watched trains coming around the Curve. Mineral Point was the earth dam holding back the flood waters at the Johnstown Reservoir, visible from the tracks. We then had some lunch and discovered that a Jehovah's Witness Convention had come to town and we did not have a room for another night and there were no available rooms within a 50-mile radius. We, therefore, decided to make tracks to Delaware. The GPS said it was only 4 hours and 2 minutes to home. We had dinner at a Cracker Barrel. (Don't tell Lena).
